

## Gender Pay Gap Summary 2025-26

The Special Partnership Trust is an employer required by law to carry out Gender Pay Gap Reporting under the Equality Act 2010 (Gender Pay Gap Information) Regulations 2017.

This involves carrying out six calculations that show the difference between the average earnings of men and women in our organisation. It does not involve publishing individual employee's data. We are required to publish the results on our own website and a government website. The six calculations are: mean gender pay gap; median gender pay gap; mean bonus gender pay gap; median bonus gender pay gap; proportion of males and females receiving a bonus payment; and proportion of males and females in each quartile band.

The results can be used to assess the following:

- \* The levels of gender equality in our workplace
- \* The balance of male and female employees at different levels
- \* How effectively talent is being maximised and rewarded

Gender Pay Reporting requires our organisation to make calculations based on employee gender. We have established this by using our existing payroll records.

The results of the statutory calculations are listed below.
